Medical Outreach Brings Relief




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In 2019, ECM conducted three medical clinics in Uganda. The first clinic was held in Naigobya, the home of ECM's newest Hope Center. We had held a "mini-clinic" there in 2018, and sensed that the need was great for a more extensive clinic. We were right! Over 300 people showed up during the two day clinic, looking for help with a variety of medical needs. As is always the case, ECM hired a local doctor to oversee the clinic, giving both credibility to the clinic as well as work for the doctor and local nurses.

A few days later we took our traveling medical show four hours down the road to Tororo, the site of another relatively new ECM Hope Center. This Hope Center services mainly children with albinism, but the clinic was open to everyone in the community. And they took advantage of the opportunity, with over 500 people showing up to receive help. Soon after, ECM-Uganda National Director Brian Mukalazi began to envision a medical clinic in Tororo specifically to meet the special needs of those with albinism. God provided the financing for Brian's big vision, and in December it became a reality. Over 600 people with albinism received medical attention, eye exams, sunglasses, lip balm and sunscreen, capping a great year at ECM for medical outreach!

Mechanical Evangelism



Charles Appiah became a street child when he was eight years old. The second of seven children, Charles left home when his father died and his mother abandoned the children. His grandmother had been taking care of all seven children but there wasn't enough food, so he made the decision to go to the street as a load porter (someone that carries other's items) so that he could get food to eat.



One day Charles met an ECM staff member (also named Charles) on the road. He approached the man, and the man started asking questions. The conversation ended with the man asking Charles to meet him on Sunday at the main truck stop in Koforidua (where ECM holds a church service every Sunday for street boys and load porters).

During the meeting Charles heard the gospel and was told about ECM, and eventually came to know the Lord. Now 24 years old, he has been supported by ECM in Vocational Training as an auto mechanic. He finished his apprenticeship at Apaak Mechanics in December 2019, and began working there as a mechanic. Soon he hopes to start his own workshop.

Why We Train Sunday School Teachers



When ECM Congo worker Pastor Mupepe visited traditional Teke villages he found three villages entirely taken over by a religious group that most would call a cult. The cult leader, Papa Floribert, had never heard straight untwisted Biblical teaching, but he was spiritually hungry and eager to learn. When Pastor Mupepe tried to organize Sunday school training in Floribert's village, he asked to come. Though his attendance as a cult leader would be out of the ordinary, it was allowed. Who could tell what God might do?

After the training, he came to Pastor Mupepe, declaring that he was repenting of his sins and was trusting Christ as Savior.

When Papa Floribert heard the Good News during the training, he knew it was something he wanted for himself. After the training, he came to Pastor Mupepe, declaring that he was repenting of his sins and was trusting Christ as Savior. When he made it known publicly that he was no longer with the cult, half of his former members followed his example and declared their faith in Christ as well.

The new church is doing well, and everyone is living in peace. There is now even a small Teachers' Resource Library in the village of Lunda. The village that spread false teaching is now a fountainhead of truth, distributing Bible lessons to the surrounding area. The children of those three villages and beyond are now hearing the truth of God's Word every week in Sunday school. To think that all this happened through ONE Sunday school training seminar!

Madina's Miracle

Ten years ago when Madina Mutesi joined the ECM child sponsorship program in Uganda, she had no idea that her first job would be with the same organization. Her light hair, eyebrows and eyelashes set her apart, but to the majority her uniqueness was an item of ridicule. "I grew up in a home with five aunties who had several other children to take care of. It was not easy to have me in school, a situation worsened by the fact that I was a child with albinism," says Madina.

Madina was born in the slums, where people live by "survival of the fittest." "People often called me a ghost," she says. Despite discrimination, Madina would always stand her ground, displaying confidence in herself. Growing up in a world where persons with albinism are considered to be ghosts and viewed by others as either curses or demi-gods that bring wealth, did not make it easy to thrive, but also did not deter her from pursuing her goals in life.





After completing high school, Madina enrolled in a 6-month confectionary course under the "Skilling the Youth" initiative. Because of her outstanding performance, the manager for the initiative chose her to give a speech before the President of Uganda on behalf of over 8,000 other graduates. The presidential handshake that followed is one Madina says she will remember for life.

On her employment with ECM, Madina says, "I didn't expect this. I never thought that ECM could employ me some day, but it's now my opportunity to give back." Madina will be working under the Special Needs and Albinism Program, the same program under which she was identified and given a future ten years ago. We are proud of her accomplishments and her courage!

14 mission trip participants served in a variety of ways in Uganda and Ghana




With an increase in 2019 of nearly **800**, ECM has now started over **4300** Sunday Schools in Congo!

Lorella Rouster

Lorella and her husband John founded ECM in 1985. Lorella continues to serve by writing Bible lessons for children in the Kituba language, enabling Sunday School teachers to evangelize and disciple the new generation in Congo. Her goal, through **The Mwinda Project**, is to create a library of lessons covering all the major events of the Bible. Lorella travels to Congo periodically to evaluate teachers as they use the lessons and to confer with Congolese staff for training, evaluation, strategizing and prayer!

Russ and Marcia Baugh

Russ and Marcia partnered with ECM in 2011 to establish **The Way Home**, a ministry to widowed grand-mothers caring for their orphaned grandchildren. In addition to building homes for the widows, The Way Home also offers extensive Bible teaching, Farming God's Way training, mentoring, and preventative nursing care. The Baughs also operate The Way Home Discipleship Training Center, where pastors and other Christian leaders receive much needed Bible training.





Linda Moore

Linda has been an ECM missionary in Uganda since 2017. Her ministry, **Shining the Light**, serves vulnerable women and children, with a special focus on those who are deaf. She teaches children skills to help them succeed in life, conducts Saturday Clubs, and shares the gospel by word and action.

Cathy has been serving with ECM in Uganda since 2011. She obtained her Ugandan nursing license so that she could assist staff nurses at Gulu Regional Hospital. She also ministers outside of the hospital, with ECM staff, through Saturday Clubs, working with children with albinism, and overseeing the health of the children in the Tegotatoo Hope Center.





Wayne and Bonnie Hollyoak

Wayne and Bonnie became ECM child sponsors in 2013, and eventually ECM missionaries in 2018. Through their ministry *In His Care* they show the love of Christ to the forgotten children of Africa, with a special focus on children with albinism. They were instrumental in the development and production of locally made sunscreen for children with albinism.

Jim and Carolyn Driscoll

Jim and Carolyn have served with ECM in Ghana since 2007. After having served for many years at Haven of Hope, they relocated to the Central Region of Ghana. They have a heart for evangelism and church planting, and are involved with helping ECM sponsored school children who are at risk to traffickers. The Driscolls host Bible studies in their home and conduct pastor/teacher training, especially in the areas of lesson preparation and evangelism.
